<u>HB 1463 – Hodges (D)</u>

for Sensory Processing Disorder Requires, beginning in the 2011-2012 school year, every public school district to screen its students for Sensory Processing Disorder (SPD) before the end of first grade and again before the end of third grade. The screening method must be approved by the newly established Children's Commission on Sensory Processing Disorder within the Department of Health and Senior Services and must be performed by an appropriately trained school employee. The screening results, with all individual identifying information removed, must be sent to the department to compile the data for review and analysis by the commission or other interested parties. If a student fails the screening, the school district must notify the student's parents or

guardians of the results and propose that the student

undergo a complete physical exam. The notice

must have a place for the parent's acknowledgment of receipt and an indication of whether the student received a complete physical exam and its results. Any physical exam within the year preceding the school screening will be sufficient for fulfilling the requirements of the bill. If a parent or guardian objects to the screening, the child will be excused upon receipt of a written request to the appropriate school administrator. The screening and its information is not a violation of the federal Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA), and the department must make a reasonable accommodation for public review and inspection of the data if no information is revealed that could identify any individual student. The commission will consist of five members appointed by the Governor including two physicians, a school nurse, and one representative each from the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education and the Missouri School Boards Association. It must analyze and adopt at least one screening test; develop, in conjunction with the department, a standardized reporting form; design and coordinate appropriate training programs for school district staff who conduct the screening; and conduct a pilot project to track the results of the screenings versus the exams.

HB 1464 – Hodges (D)

Relating to oxygen use in residential settings Requires health care facilities to notify the local fire department of the date and address when they provide oxygen tanks or apparatuses to a patient or customer in a residential setting. Notification must also be given by the facility when these supplies are removed.

HB 1480 – Hughes (D)

Establishes the MO Universal Health Insurance Act and the Universal Health Insurance Program Upon voter approval, this bill establishes the Missouri Universal Health Insurance Act and the Universal Health Insurance Program within the Department of Health and Senior Services to provide comprehensive and necessary health care services for Missouri residents. No deductibles, copayments, co-insurance, or other cost-sharing measures will be imposed. Only public or nonprofit institutions meeting state quality and licensing guidelines can be a participating provider in the program. Private health insurers cannot sell insurance coverage that duplicates benefits provided by the program. The program will establish and maintain regional offices; and the department director will provide funding, subject to appropriations, for each region's expenditures. The program and regional offices will pay the expenses of institutional providers of health care, and each provider is required to negotiate an annual budget with the program which will cover anticipated expenses. The program will reimburse independent providers of health care on a fee-for-service basis. Other insurers and employers may offer benefits that do not duplicate those offered by the program. The program will be funded: 1. By vastly reduced paperwork; 2. By requiring a rational bulk procurement of medications; 3. From existing sources of state revenue for health care; 4. By increasing personal income taxes on the top 5% income earners; 5. By instituting a modest payroll tax; and 6. By instituting a small tax on stock and bond transactions. The State Board of Universal Ouality and Access is established consisting of 15 members appointed by the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Senate. The board will meet at least twice a year to advise the department director on a regular basis to ensure quality, access, and affordability and to report its recommendations

SB 742 – Shoemyer (D)

Modifies membership of MO HealthNet Oversight Committee

Modifies the membership of the MO HealthNet Oversight Committee by adding an optometrist, a nurse, a mental health professional, a licensed physical therapist, as well as representatives from a not-for-profit health network serving rural counties and providing both patient-based and provider member services, the state association representing the majority of the long-term care facilities licensed in this state, the durable medical equipment industry, a Medicaid managed care organization, a rural health clinic and a federally qualified health clinic. The bill also specifies that the committee shall have three patient advocates rather than two. Of the three advocates, one advocate shall represent children, one the disabled, and one the elderly community. In addition, rather than designating two primary care physicians and two physicians, the act now references four licensed physicians, two each

from rural and urban areas, and board certified in their specialty.

Prohibits the Secretary of State from approving an electronic voting system unless it produces the election results from paper ballots that voters have marked by hand or by paper marking devices designed to assist disabled voters. If any election authority uses any direct-record electronic touchscreen vote-counting machine to accommodate disabled voters, it may continue to use the machine until it is removed from its inventory because of mechanical malfunction, wear and tear, or any other reason when it must be replaced with a machine having paper ballot marking devices for the disabled. The bill specifies that the official ballot must be a paper ballot that is hand-marked by the voter or by a paper ballot-marking device designed to be used by disabled voters.

MENTAL HEALTH

HB 1298 - Lampe (D)

Relating to the transfer of a mental health patient from one facility to another

SB 774 – Lembke (R)

Creates additional measures intended to increase safety at the Department of Mental Health Creates the crime of endangering a Department of Mental Health employee, visitor or other person at a secured facility, or another person ordered to the department. A person ordered to the department as a sexually violent predator commits such act if he or she attempts to cause or knowingly causes any such individual to come into contact with blood, seminal fluid, urine, feces, or saliva. This crime is equivalent to the crime of endangerment by a criminal offender against a Department of Corrections employee, visitor, and other offender. Such offense is a Class D felony unless the substance is unidentified, in which case it is a Class A misdemeanor. If the person is knowingly infected with HIV, Hepatitis B or C and exposes another person to such disease, by committing this crime, it is a Class C felony. This act adds additional criminal offenses, which if a person has committed, disqualifies him or her from being employed in a direct-care position with the Department of Mental Health.
