Establishes the Missouri Universal Health Assurance Program which is a publicly financed, statewide program to provide comprehensive necessary health, mental health, and dental care services and preventive screenings for Missouri residents. The Director of the Department of Health and Senior Services is required to divide the

population of the state into six regional health planning and policy development districts with approximately equal population. An advisory council of nine members appointed by the Governor will be established for each district. The advisory councils will assist the board of governors of the program in developing an annual comprehensive state health care plan and a transportation plan for indigent, elderly, and disabled clients to access necessary nonemergency health care services. The program will be administered by a 23-member board of governors, 14 of whom will be appointed by the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Senate. The directors of the departments of Social Services, Health and Senior Services, and Mental Health will be ex-officio members; and the board will include minority and disabled individuals as well as health professionals. The board's responsibilities will include monitoring expenditures, adopting rules, employing staff, and studying methods for incorporating institutional and long-term care benefits into the program. The board is also required to submit an annual report to the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the President Pro Tem of the Senate, and the Governor on the program's activities and recommendations for changes in insurance and health care laws to improve access to health care. Prior to the implementation of the comprehensive plan, the board is required to appoint advisory subcommittees of medical professionals and medical and health care ethics experts to conduct hearings to gather public comment. The comprehensive plan is required to seek the most cost-effective delivery of health care services. The bill also creates the Missouri Health Care Trust Fund to be used to finance the program using federal funds. Moneys in the fund are not subject to appropriation or allotment by the state or any political subdivision of the state. Various accounts are created within the fund for specific purposes. Every person who is a resident of Missouri, regardless of pre-existing conditions, will be eligible to receive benefits for covered services. Individuals who are not residents but are employed in Missouri and pay the health assurance premium will be eligible for benefits. The board is required to request that the program be made available to federal employees and retirees

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while they are residents of Missouri. Certain health care services are excluded from coverage. No participating provider can refuse to furnish services to an eligible person on the basis of race, color, income level, national origin, religion, sex, sexual orientation, or other nonmedical criteria. The program is required to pay the expenses of institutional providers of health care, and each provider is required to negotiate an annual budget with the program which will cover anticipated expenses. The program will reimburse independent providers of health care on a fee-for-service basis using the federal Medicare reimbursement fees as a guideline. Other insurers and employers may offer benefits that do not duplicate services offered by the program. To finance the program, every Missouri resident is required to pay a health assurance tax prorated based on the person's Missouri adjusted gross income which will be collected by the Department of Revenue and deposited into the trust fund. If a federal universal health program is implemented, the tax must be decreased as specified in the bill. No later than 30 days after the effective date of the bill, the Department of Social Services is required to apply to the United States Secretary of Health and Human Services for all health care program waivers that will allow the state to deposit federal funds into the trust fund. The department is also required to identify other federal funding sources. The program will become effective April 1 of the year following the award of a waiver by the United States Department of Health and Human Services. Notice of the receipt of the waiver must be given to the Missouri Reviser of Statutes.

This act requires a pharmacist, pharmacist technician, or pharmacy intern to provide notification to the patient, a family member, other relative, or any other person identified by the patient before interchanging one manufacturer of an anti-epileptic drug for another manufacturer of an anti-epileptic drug in instances where the patient's epilepsy or seizures is currently being controlled on a specific drug, strength, dosage form, and dosing regimen from a specific manufacturer. The prescriber of the medication must also be notified prior to the interchange. This requirement shall not apply to prescriptions dispensed for inpatients of a hospital, a long-term care facility or inpatients of a mental health or residential facility.

Beginning January 1, 2011, this bill allows voters to cast advance ballots starting on the third Wednesday before any election. Any registered voter may vote by advance ballot at the central voting location designated by the election authority. Voting will be allowed on weekdays from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. and on Saturdays until 12:00 p.m. through the close of regular business hours on the Wednesday before the election.

Specifies that the use of force by a parent, guardian, or other person entrusted with the care and supervision of a minor or incompetent person; a teacher or other person entrusted with the care and supervision of a minor for a special purpose; a person responsible for operating or maintaining order in a vehicle with other passengers; or a physician or person assisting a physician is justifiable if the person is acting in self defense. A person will not be guilty of the crime of patient, resident, or client abuse or neglect if acting in self defense or in defense of others beats, strikes, or injures a person, patient, resident, or client of a mental health or residential facility.

Legalizes the use of marijuana for medicinal purposes under certain conditions

Changes the laws regarding the classification of marijuana as a controlled substance and allows its use for medicinal purposes. In its main provisions, the bill: 1. Removes marijuana from the Schedule I classification for controlled substances and

reclassifies it under Schedule II; 2. Prohibits the arrest, prosecution, or penalty in any manner of a qualifying patient who possesses a written certification for the medical use of marijuana if the quantity doesn't exceed an adequate supply. A qualifying patient younger than 18 years of age is also exempt from arrest, prosecution, or penalty if a parent or guardian consents in writing to and controls the medical use of marijuana; 3. Prohibits a physician from being subject to arrest, prosecution, penalty, or denial of any right or privilege for providing written certification for the medical use of marijuana to a qualifying patient; 4. Requires marijuana, drug paraphernalia, or other property seized from a qualifying patient or primary caregiver in connection with the claimed medical use of marijuana to be returned to the patient or caregiver immediately upon a determination by a court or prosecutor that the individual is entitled to the protections contained in the bill; 5. Gives qualifying patients the same legal rights as other pharmaceutically medicated individuals relating to routine traffic stops, interaction with law enforcement that does not involve an illegal act, employer interaction, and drug testing pertaining to marijuana and its metabolites; 6. Prohibits the medical use of marijuana when it compromises the health or well-being of another. The smoking of marijuana is prohibited in a school bus, public bus, or other public vehicle; in the workplace; on school grounds; in a correctional facility; or at any public park, public beach, public recreation center, or youth center unless the area is designated for medical marijuana use; 7. Prohibits the fraudulent representation to any law enforcement official of any fact or circumstance relating to the medical use of marijuana to avoid arrest or prosecution. A person who violates this provision will be guilty of a petty misdemeanor and subject to a \$500 fine; 8. Allows a qualifying patient or a primary caregiver to assert the medical use of marijuana as a defense to any prosecution involving marijuana based on certain evidence; 9. Requires the Department of Health and Senior Services to establish rules for governing the issuance of registry identification cards to qualifying patients and primary caregivers. A qualifying patient or the primary caregiver is

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required to submit an application containing certain information, along with a registration fee not to exceed \$100 per qualifying patient, before receiving the card. The department has 30 days to approve or deny an application; 10. Requires the department to maintain a confidential list of persons who have been issued a card; and 11. Requires an organization to register with the department in order to sell, administer, deliver, dispense, distribute, cultivate, or possess marijuana or related equipment, supplies, educational materials, or marijuana seeds for medical use. The bill contains a referendum clause and will be submitted to qualified voters in November 2011.

This bill directs the courts to rely heavily on judicial interpretations of Title VII of the Civil Rights Act, the Age Discrimination in Employment Act, and the Americans with Disabilities Act when deciding MHRA employment discrimination cases. Parties to a discrimination case under the MHRA may

demand a jury trial. Damages awarded for employment cases under the MHRA shall not exceed back pay and interest on back pay and \$50,000 for employers with between 5 and 100 employees, \$100,000 for employers with between 100 and 200 employees, \$200,000 for employers with between 200 and 500 employees, or \$300,000 for employers with more than 500 employees. Punitive damages shall not be awarded against the state of Missouri or political subdivisions in MHRA cases.

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Establishes the High School Sports Brain Injury Prevention Act which requires school boards to work with the Missouri State High School Activities Association to develop guidelines, information, and forms for coaches, student athletes, and their parents or guardians on the nature and risk of concussions and head injuries, including information on continuing to play after a concussion or head injury. An information sheet must be signed and returned each year by the athletes and their parents or guardians before an athlete can practice or compete. An athlete suspected of sustaining a concussion or head injury must be removed from competition until evaluated by a licensed health care provider trained in the evaluation and management of concussions and receives a written clearance from the provider to return to play. A health care provider who volunteers and authorizes a return to play will not be civilly liable for damages resulting from any act or omission in rendering the care except in the case of gross negligence or willful or wanton misconduct.

Requires the Department of Transportation's plans, programs, and projects to provide full consideration for the safety and contiguous routes for bicyclists, pedestrians, disabled persons, and transit users of all ages and abilities. Bicycle and pedestrian ways or accommodations must be given full consideration in the planning and development of transportation facilities by the department, including their incorporation into state plans and programs. Consideration of bicycle and pedestrian ways or accommodations are not required where there is an absence of need or an excessive cost disproportionate for the need or where bicycling or walking is not permitted.

The bill specifies that any attempt to pay, or an actual payment of, a utility bill will not adversely affect the assistance that an otherwise eligible household would receive through the Utilicare Program and removes the requirement that

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households must have their service disconnected for failure to pay their bill before being eligible for assistance. Electric or gas companies must allow customers who incur an arrearage during the cold weather rule period to retain service by paying one-third of the arrearage, plus the current bill, in each of the three months following the cold weather rule period.

Allows for a special license plate designated "Multiple Sclerosis Society." To obtain the plate, a person must submit an application to the Director of the Department of Revenue accompanied by an emblem-use authorization statement along with an additional \$15 fee. Any person who was previously issued a Multiple Sclerosis Society plate and who does not provide an emblem-use authorization statement at a subsequent time of registration will be issued a new plate which does not bear the Multiple Sclerosis Society's emblem.

HB 1661 – Pratt (R)

Changes laws regarding state purchasing as it relates to giving preference to any qualified nonprofit agency for the blind or severely disabled

Changes the laws regarding state purchasing as it relates to giving preference to any qualified agency for the blind or the severely disabled. In its main provisions, the bill: 1. Requires the Commissioner of the Office of Administration to determine a fair market price for all products and services offered for sale to state agencies and political subdivisions by any qualified nonprofit agency for the blind or the severely disabled; 2. Requires the commissioner to develop rules regarding the assignment of products and services to be supplied by nonprofit agencies for the blind and severely disabled; 3.

Authorizes the commissioner to purchase products and services elsewhere when requisitions cannot be reasonably complied by the nonprofit agencies for the blind and the severely disabled; 4. Requires the commission to publish a list of suitable products

and services provided by qualified nonprofit agencies for the blind and severely disabled and to distribute the list to all purchasing officers of the state and its political subdivisions; 5. Requires all products and services provided by nonprofit agencies for the blind and severely disabled to be procured at the price established by the commissioner if the product or service is available within a reasonable time; 6. Specifies the language that must be included in all contracts entered into between legislative, executive, or judicial agencies and private contract vendors; 7. Prohibits the purchase by any state agency of similar products and services at comparable prices and quality from any other source than a nonprofit agency for the blind or severely disabled if the nonprofit agency certifies that its products meet the comparable performance specifications, price, and quality requirements established by the commissioner; 8. Authorizes the commissioner and any state agency to enter into contractual agreements, cooperative working relationships, or other arrangements with nonprofit agencies for the blind and severely disabled and allows the commissioner to secure information from any state agency in order to develop effective and efficient delivery of products and services; 9. Requires the head of each state agency to annually submit a report of its purchases to the commissioner who must publish a report of the performance of the state use program to all nonprofit agencies for the blind and the severely disabled, all state agencies, the General Assembly, and the Governor; and 10. Allows the Governor to appoint a committee of at least eight members to collaborate to further the policy objectives in the bill. The committee must consist of five members of the General Assembly, at least one representative from a qualified nonprofit agency for the blind, at least one representative from a qualified nonprofit agency for the severely disabled, and at least one private citizen.
